

Sustaining quality and ethics in remote area dental health systems: An expose from the extremes of Australia - Prof.dr. Marc Tennant

CV

Marc has been academic for 25 years he is currently the Director (and Founder) of the International Re-search Collaborative - Oral Health and Equity at UWA and has served in senior leadership roles in Universities across Australia. The Collaborative is a global leader in driving reform focused on marginalisation and addressing health inequality. The team is recognised as the leading oral health R&D group in Western Australia and in 2015-16 Marc was the most published Australian in dentistry. Marc remains in the top half dozen dental Australian academics for impact, with 200 publications and \$15-20million in R&D funding. He and the collaborative hold 8 of the top dozen most cited articles in dentistry in Western Australian history. Marc has lead the development of the Collaborative that is strongly focused on enhancing the leadership base in dentistry globally; influence stretching from the Middle East through the sub-continent to Asia and out into the Pacific (www.ircohe.net) and has more than 120 Fellows and 50 graduate students and 50-100 other students. This world-class group has been acknowledged by WHO within inclusion in its Global Workforce. Marc has received many awards acknowledging this lifetime commitment to the reform agenda in oral health recently had a café named in his honour, has honorary professorial appointments in 6 Universities. Marc is a life-Fellow of the Brocher Foundation, a life-Fellow of the dental students society for services to education and a life-Fellow of Saint Catherine's College, for services to the community. Marc is also a fellow of the RACDS by acclimation. Marc's social media influence is substantial his Twitter handle is the most read personal handle in dentistry in Australia and his YouTube channels have reached over four hundred thousand viewers in 125 countries. Marc has served in many executive leadership roles (Dean and Head of School roles) in Dental Schools across Australia; managing complex stakeholder interactions, including government, universities and communities. He has led the resurgence of dental education in Australia. Marc continues his lifelong efforts towards reducing social disadvantage and marginalization.

Ethics in Forensic Art and dealing with the Press - Myke Taister, FBI, USA

Abstract

How can an artist assist Police with an investigation? Most people can't answer this question. My presentation explores the role of a Forensic Artist in FBI investigations. The lecture includes some of the history beginning in the 1800 to current day technology in the forensic art field. The presentation includes several different disciplines including; composite drawing, face ageing, skeletal reconstruction, and disguise work. I use actual casework to explain the different situations and crimes and technology used. Having worked almost every major FBI case while employed as a forensic artist, I can talk from personal experience about these important cases. Often a Forensic Artist will need the assistance and advise of other professionals including forensic odontologist, forensic anthropologist, and sometimes cosmetologist. Teamwork is



important to an investigation and each person has a role to contribute. A forensic artist can also assist in determining if a witness is being truthful or not, I will present a case from Kabul, Afghanistan illustrating this point. Probably the most important area of concern is how to present your work to the press, after all just because you do the art, if no one sees it the subject will never be identified.

CV

Myke Taister is a retired FBI Forensic Artist, where he worked on most major cases investigated by the FBI for 30 years. Since his retirement Mr. Taister returned to work at the FBI as a contractor specializing in exhibits and displays. He is active and sits on the Board of Governors of the International Association of Craniofacial Identification (IACI). In 2013 he received a life time achievement award from the IACI.

Disciplinary proceedings against dentists – Wolter Brands, President Royal Dutch Dental Association, Dentist and lawyer, NL

Abstract

Nearly all countries have a disciplinary court. In this lecture we will discuss the outcomes of a research of about 900 verdicts of the Dutch dental disciplinary courts concerning dentists. We will focus on the complainer and the defendant and address several questions. Is the majority of complainers male or female? What triggers a formal complaint? What motives are given for a complaint? What is the change in Holland to be involved in a formal procedure and how does this affect the defendant? How often have defendant and complainer legal assistance and what are the pros and contras of legal aid? Finally we will discuss several types of complainers and defendants.

CV

Wolter Brands DDS JD PhD is dentist and co-owner of a dental practice. He was an associate professor at the UMC st Radboud and president of IDEALS. At this moment he serves as a substitute judge in a civil court and is president of the Royal Dutch Dental Association. Brands is a member of the committee that rewrites the FDI Dental Ethics Manual. His research is about the impact of law on daily dental practice. He publishes and speaks about this topic, both nationally and internationally.

The dental patient and ethics - Jan Benedictus, NPCF (dutch association for patients)

Abstract
